## In Memoriam - Jay Sicard, N5PWG, Silent Key

As you know from my earlier E-mails, Jay passed away quite suddenly late last month. He is greatly missed by his family, including the amateur radio family of which we are all a part.

His wife, Lura, told me that she believed he was first licensed at the age of 12 or 13, which would be in the late 1930's. I don't know what other calls he may have had or if he was continuously active (other than the war years), but he was certainly one of the pioneers of our hobby.

Jay was a stalwart supporter of NTS and particularly of TEX. When we needed help last year due to the resignation of some members due to family needs, he was one of the first to volunteer to take RN5 liaison slots, which he had never done before, as well as expand his NCS role. His fine bug keying technique was a pleasure to hear. Both of those qualities earned him the Pfeiffer Pfist award this year. Lura told me he truly treasured it.

While we have maintained late Friday TEX as "bug night" ever since Jay started as NCS there, I would like to keep that going in his memory. All of you who have semi-automatic keys (bugs), please dust them off, re-adjust them, and join us on late TEX Friday evenings when you are able. I always use my bug on that net, even when I'm NCS (it is a lot more work than a keyer). You can, too.



The following obituary was taken from publications in the Pasadena area. I present it here for those of you who did not know Jay that well. While there are a few errors in it, and notably the absence of his callsign, I am providing it as received.

### **John Whitney Sicard Jr. (Jay)**

Beloved husband of 59 years to Lura Weaver Sicard, he passed away suddenly on Thursday, Oct. 20, 2011, at age 85 in Pasadena, Texas. Born in Baton Rouge in 1926, he served in the U.S. Navy during World War II. He was a graduate of LSU in chemical engineering, and brought his family to

Pasadena in 1956 when he joined the start-up of the Celanese Plastics Plant on the Battleground Road.

His community service included membership in the Pasadena Jaycees, United Fund Area Chairman, and many years as a Harris County Precinct Chairman and Election Judge. He was a life member of the Knights of Columbus, Council 3700, and had served with several environmental organizations.

A longtime Radio Amateur and member of ARRL, he volunteered his services during hurricanes when there was no other communication, and regularly participated with several Radio Networks including ARES, Texas CW, and the 7290 Traffic Net. He was the proud recipient of the 7290 "Pfeiffer Pfist Award for 2011" in recognition of CW excellence.

He retired from BASF Chemical Corporation, Freeport, in January 1996 at age 70. Preceded in death by sons, J. Whitney Sicard, III and Frank "Skippy" McNelis. Survived by his daughters, Katherine Sicard Hara, Barbara McNelis Peacock and husband Larry; sons, Christopher Sicard, Tom Sicard, Jonathan McNelis and wife Vicky; 13 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. Jay and Lura have been advocates for the fundraising efforts by the Pasadena Public Library, and would welcome any contributions in his memory made to the library.

A memorial service will be held at St. Pius V Church in Pasadena, date and time pending final arrangements. Words of comfort may be shared with the family at [www.grandviewfunerals.com](http://www.grandviewfunerals.com).

## **RANDOM RECOLLECTIONS OF AN OLD HAM**

Geo continues his new duties at Headquarters.

### **CHAPTER 34AB - ARRL Apparatus Bureau (Continued)**

One of the most critical shortages was meters and other measuring equipment. We were visited by a representative of Galvin Manufacturing Co. of Chicago, who claimed to be in charge of procurement of this type of equipment under a subcontract with Hallicrafters, a principal supplier of communications gear for the armed services. I remember the man as a brash, outspoken extrovert, but I don't remember his name. He offered \$3 for each meter sent in. We were to collect the meters from amateur donors, tag each one with the name and address of the ham or other person who sent it in, and a Galvin man would show up from time to time to take the meters off our hands.

"Three dollars per meter" became a bone of contention. QST solicitation failed to specify that meters be of certain makes, only that they must be in working condition when received. The result was that some of the meters were of inferior brands ("Readrite" meters were considered to be in this category), which had not cost \$3 when purchased, so the "donor" would be profiting from the exchange. On the other hand, many meters (Weston, GE, etc.) were worth a great deal more than \$3, but were sent in with the understanding that the donor would accept that amount. Profiteering versus patriotism, a common syndrome of war. The Galvin man (let's call him Blake) would not accept the cheap meters.

KB contended that the solicitation, approved by Galvin, promised \$3 for each meter received in working condition. No mention had been made of quality. Blake contended, almost sneeringly, that it wouldn't make good business sense to pay \$3 for a meter worth less than a dollar.

KB countered with the implication that Galvin wouldn't mind, however, greatly profiting from paying only \$3 for meters that were worth a great deal more than that. Blake refused even to consider such an argument, stating flatly that Galvin would not pay more than it was worth for any meter, nor accept any meter of the Readrite type, but would pay only a maximum of \$3 for a meter regardless of its worth. Business was for profit, even (especially) during wartime.

## **TEX Net Topics**

With the loss of Jay, we need help with **15** open NCS/liaison slots, including **3** open *primary* NCS slots and **7** open *primary* RN5 slots on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday (all shown in **red**). Please consider taking one of these, or even just an open backup position. The RN5 liaisons are sorely needed. Thanks, Randy, for taking 2 open slots.

We have now entered our "winter" season and all nets have moved back to 80 meters, even the early sessions. Note that 40 meters still appears to be working pretty well at 8:00 local, so it may still be useful for early TEX if the noise on 80 is too strong (from T-storms, in particular). At least we hope to have some more T-storms (ANY rain, no matter what, is most welcome anywhere in Texas these days).

Early RN5 changed back to 3567 KHz on Nov. 6th with the time change, as did early TEX go back to 3541 KHz. Of course, the Sweepstakes contest was still going on, so alternate frequencies had to be used that night for the early sessions. CAN changed to 3552 KHz on Nov. 1, and PAN changed to 3552 KHz a couple weeks into October.

### Operating:

A few tips, based on things heard on the air recently.

According to the Public Service Communications Manual, it is common practice to provide the message number when acknowledging traffic on voice nets (e.g., roger number 32). However, that is not done on CW nets. Just send a simple "QSL" without adding any number. You could add the number of messages being acknowledged if more than one was received without an intervening "QSL".

When receiving a message, if the sending station has QSK, try to break by sending a string of dots as soon as you miss something rather than asking after the message has been sent. It is generally quicker that way. After he stops sending, send the last word you received and he should continue with that. Also, if there is more than one message to be received, it is common practice to just send a dit or "K" after each message where no fills are needed. You can then QSL after the last one and optionally include the number of messages being QSL'ed.
